Message from our Menahel

At the end of this week's parsha, the תורה tells us that בני settled in גשן.

"ווישב ישראל בארץ מצרים בארץ גשן..."

"And Yisroel settled in the land of Mitzrayim, in the land of Goshen..." (פרק מ"ז, כ"ז)

Rav Moshe Feinstein, זצ״ל, asks: "We already knew that ארץ גשן is located in ארץ מצרים so why doesn't the pasuk just write ארץ גשן?"

Rav Moshe, זע"ל, answers that the pasuk specifies both ארץ מצרים and ארץ גשן to teach us two very important hashkafic concepts. First, even during גלות we strove to live separately from the Egyptians in order for us not to assimilate or even be slightly influenced by Egyptian culture. We must understand how important it is that when we live in גלות we must be on guard against the influence from our popular culture. The second concept that we can learn from the pasuk is that we can learn Torah wherever we are in גלות Torah will have an impact and an influence wherever it is learned. We must always do our utmost to impart to the next generation, our children, the beautiful rich mesorah we have received from our parents and grandparents.

Together as partners, we have the critical task of showing our children the beauty of our mesorah and the significance of not being influenced by the popular culture we are surrounded by until the arrival of משיח צדקינו אמן במהרה בימינו אמן.

STEM Chanukah Project

In honor of Chanukah, Mr. Markovitz's STEM class, began a module called 'The Chanukah Flame and the Chemistry of Combustion'. The class observed and learned about the main components of an unlit candle, which is composed of paraffin wax (made up of hydrocarbons) and a wick. They then lit and observed

the three different regions of a flame, learning which were the 'coolest' and 'hottest'. After learning the secret of how "trick" birthday candles relight after being blown out (and doing their own version with a regular candle), the class utilized a special scale to test their hypotheses for what would happen to the length and mass of a candle that is lit for only 30-60 seconds. Finally, the class used beeswax and wicks to create their own Chanukah candles which they were able to take home.
